Rector's Pastoral Letter

Easter Message

I wonder if you have a favourite story. A story that never get old no matter how many times you hear it. When I was a child, there were a few books that I could just keep reading day after day. And every time I read them, scenes came alive so vividly that I felt I was in the story.

One of my favourite childhood stories was the story of the elves and the shoemaker. You may have heard of it. Every time I read the story, I could see the shoemakers' shop, sense the smell of leathers and of freshly made shoes. I could see the shock on the face of the shoemaker and his wife. I could hear the giggles of the elves. Now I read it to my boys. And I can see them seeing and feeling the same way just as I did.

Some stories never get old. And then there are stories that never stop surprising you. Every time you hear them, you discover something new. For me, the story in John's gospel where Mary encounters the risen Christ is one of them.

It was early in the morning. The world was still in darkness as the shadow of the silent Saturday was still lingering. Everything and everyone in Jerusalem were asleep. Except Mary Magdalene who made her way to the garden tomb.

Picture her arriving at the tomb of the one whom had changed her entire life. Jesus had met Mary at a time when her life was in complete disrepair. She lacked joy, she lacked peace, she lacked freedom, she lacked fullness until Jesus came. And then everything changed.

She had followed him ever since. She had had been there by his side during the trials. She had been there while they whipped him to the point where he could not even be recognised. She had been there to witness his crucifixion. And now

she is there in the darkness, wandering into the garden so that she can come and pay respects to him at the tomb.

As she approaches closer to the tomb, she sees the gargantuan stone that had been used to seal up the tomb has been rolled way. And in her mind in the moment, that could mean only one thing.

Robbers have come and they have stolen the body of her lord. She races away so she can tell the disciples. Two of them immediately run along with her back to the tomb. Those two go in and corroborate that indeed Jesus' body is not there. Then the two rushes away, leaving Mary alone. Typical men's response, I would say. They want to fix the situation immediately.

Long after they have gone, Mary still remains. She is weeping a river of tears. As the sun starts to rise, she looks inside the tomb and she realises that there are two angels that have come. They ask her. 'Why are you weeping?'

She doesn't even flinch by the sight of the angels. Grief has numbed her senses. The absence of Jesus whom she loved dearly left her soul hollow, her mind empty. After all those miracles and transformed live, is it where this ends? Back to where she was once again? Alone, empty, powerless, hopeless?

'I have come looking for Jesus and I cannot find him. Where is his body?' she replies, her voice shaking with sorrow and worry.

She is still weeping. She has seen two angels just now but even their presence can't take the place of Jesus, the one whom she loved. For any of us who have experienced losing someone whom we loved deeply, we can say the same thing. It doesn't matter how much success we achieved, no matter how much money we make, no matter how famous we are, even angels cannot take the place of the one whom we love, who has changed our lives.

Before the angels reply, something garners her attention. Whether it's the rustle in the foliage behind or whether it's the breeze of early morning, she senses something behind her. She turns around and she looks at someone standing there whom she supposes to be the gardener.

She doesn't know that it's Jesus. Whether it's because her vision is blurred with tears; or whether it is because Jesus is standing in front of the sun that is just rising; Whatever the reason, she doesn't know that it's him. And again this person poses the same question: 'Woman, why are you crying?'

And she pours her heart out in so many words. But what she is saying is one thing. 'Just give me Jesus.'

And then he says her name. He says, 'Mary'.

She's only known one person to speak her name with that kind of love and kindness. And in that moment, the gospel becomes not just powerful. It becomes personal. When she hears her name, her eyes are open, she recognises that this isn't the gardener. This is Jesus Christ.

Friends, it was when Jesus called her name, that her eyes were open to recognise Jesus. The world looked the same, the Romans were still there. The cross was still there. The grave was still there. But the moment he called her name, everything changed.

And he is doing the same even now. I can tell you because I am witness to it; that Jesus Christ is still calling people's names. One by one, he calls our names. And when he does, the gospel becomes not just powerful but personal.

Like Mary, he comes to us when we feel we are left alone. Times when we cannot see God because we are struggling whether that being our grief or depression, or anxiety, or addiction, or debts, or relationship breakdown or cancer. Like Mary, we cry out 'Where is Jesus? I cannot find him!'

Hear the good news from Mary. He comes to you and calls your names even when you can't see him. In all stories of Easter, never a single occasion there is where people see the risen Jesus first and calls him. It's always Jesus who comes to them first and call their names. Only then their eyes open and they recognise the risen Christ.

Now Mary races away, becoming the very first witness of the resurrection. She is the Apostle of the Apostles, telling everyone of what her eyes have seen: Jesus has been raised from the dead.

She's our eyewitness. And you know how it is when you have an eyewitness. Think about it when you're watching the news and the reporter is giving you information. It's one thing to hear the information. But once that reporter takes the microphone and puts it in front of a person who was there; a person who saw it for themselves, all of sudden, the story becomes alive.

Mary is our eyewitness. She saw him with her own eyes. She heard his voice with her own ears. She communicates to us that Jesus raised from the grave and he is still alive today. But it's not just her. There have been and still are

billions and billions of eyewitnesses who met risen Christ, who tells us the same message.

I know one of them. Her name is Hilary.

Hilary lived all her life as a follower of Jesus. A couple of weeks ago, after Sunday service, someone told me that Hilary's health was deteriorating. So I looked at my diary and thought I would see her on the coming Friday. It was a very busy week.

Halfway through the week, it was Wednesday morning. I was sitting at a meeting. And I noticed a voice kept on whispering in my heart, 'Jun, you need to see Hilary. You need to see Hilary'. The voice was so gentle and yet so clear. I looked at my diary and thought if I can finish this meeting a bit early then I can quickly see her on my way. And so I did. While I was on my way to see Hilary, the voice said to me again. 'Jun, you need to be prepared. You need to be prepared.' So I stopped by the church, got the communion and the kits for the last rites.

When I arrived, Hilary was surrounded by Hugh and her family. We prayed together for her. We laid our hands on her. We anointed her with holy oil. And we commend her to God. And by the time we finished, we could see she was very peaceful. Her breathing was calm and her eyes were closed.

And just when I was saying good bye to her, suddenly her eyes opened and she looked up. I was surprised and thought she was trying to look at me to say good bye. But then I saw a big, beautiful smile on her face. A moment ago, she was struggling to breathe and now she was smiling with her eyes open!

When I close my eyes, I can still see her smile and those eyes. But I couldn't make out what made her eyes open let alone the smile. Later that day, I received a message from Hugh, her husband. He said, 'Two minutes after you left, Hilary died peacefully'. Only then I understood. She wasn't trying to look at me. She opened her eyes because she heard. She heard the voice that called her name. The same voice that whispered in my heart. The same voice that called Mary in the garden on that first Easter Sunday morning. I am absolutely convinced that's why she smiled. Because she saw the same person that Mary saw on that Easter morning.

Friends, there are many great stories in the world. But only the stories that are true can change lives. The reason why we not only can believe but trust the Easter story is not because it's a great story but because it's real and it has

changed billions and billions of lives over 2000 years. And it is still happening now just as it happened to Hilary, Hugh, their family and me. Jesus is risen and he is alive today. He is calling our name just he did on that first Easter Sunday morning. And because he lives and calls our names today, we can face tomorrow, come what may.

May we hear his voice and may the joy and hope of Easter fill our hearts today and the days to come.



Butterflies for 800th Anniversary



What better way to celebrate our 800 year anniversary, than by celebrating the diversity and vibrancy of our church and community with a display of beautiful butterflies, each one as unique as we are.

It's really appropriate that we are launching our project on Easter Sunday, the day we remember Jesus' marvellous resurrection and naturally think of rebirth, as butterflies are one of very few creatures that can completely transform into something completely different.

As we look at the intricate and beautiful designs of each butterfly we are reminded of the marvel of God's creation. The incredible transformation from caterpillar to butterfly is like our own spiritual journey. We leave our old selves

behind as we are transformed through our faith In Christ, growing spiritually just as a butterfly leaves its cocoon and takes flight into the world.

Our vision is to cover the front of the balcony with a fabulous display of butterflies. That's where we need you!

We want everyone (and we do mean everyone) to take part in this project by creating a butterfly. There are some examples on the pillar at the back of the church to give you some ideas, but you can create and decorate your butterfly however you want. As a guide we suggest anything up to A5 size, (or about half an A4 piece of paper).

There are some paper butterflies in the box at the back of the church in different sizes and different colours for you to decorate. Please take one, or feel free to create your own. Please also take one for friends and family to take part too. Our linked primary schools are going to be creating butterflies as are little fishes, our messy vintage group, junior church and hopefully more groups as our project continues. Ultimately we hope to have a truly fabulous display representing our whole community.

Once completed, please place butterflies in the box in the Welcomers' corner. Then over the next few months we will start to build up the display on the front of the balcony. Hopefully by the time of our patronal festival at the end of June we will have over 800 butterflies. And if we manage to completely cover the balcony then you may start to see butterflies appearing in other places in the church...

One final point, we are hoping to have hundreds and hundreds of butterflies so please understand that we cannot return butterflies.

Sharing the Easter Story, Rev.Tracy (Curate)

I consider it an essential part of my role to tell people about Jesus, and to share the Easter story. This is a busy time of year so I was thankful to be given a 'morning off' and let the children of Bridgewater Primary School step in and tell the Easter story to the many parents, who gathered to see Year 5's Easter Assembly.

The children acted and sang the Easter story with talent and passion, and I found myself feeling quite emotional! The children had been preparing for over four weeks, learning lines, songs and actions, and the experience had been an enjoyable one, judging from the smiles on the children's faces. Parents were listening, engaging, and like me, were moved by the story – a story which changed the world, and is continuing to change the world today.

We visit Bridgewater Primary School on a regular basis, taking assemblies or giving short talks in classes. I particularly enjoy inviting the children to ask questions — a risk, but one that brings great reward! We also enjoy visiting Abington Vale Primary School, and I recently had the privilege of sharing the Easter story with the children there. Revd. Jun has also been busy visiting Weston Favell Primary School, taking assemblies on a number of themes.

We can worry that our society today cares little for religion; that we are becoming a nation without faith, but my experience within our primary schools shows me how treasured Christian heritage is. We might not see these children in church, we might never get to meet their parents, but thanks to the work happening in primary schools, the Christian message is being told, being shared. Seeds are being planted. Perhaps this Easter, we might pray for school children, and their families, that the Easter story will be heard, remembered, and find good soil in which to grow.
