### **Rector's Pastoral Letter**

# Concluding the year of 800th Anniversary

How quickly the world changes. I wrote an article under the above title in advance a few weeks ago, thinking that December is going to be a very busy month. I thought I was being prepared for once! Well, so many things happened and changed over the last few weeks: A distressing report, the Makin Review, was



released about abuses in the church in the past. The Archbishop of Canterbury resigned. Martial law was declared and then lifted in South Korea. Communities damaged by floods and the storm. And a tree fell in our churchyard!

How little did I know about what was going to happen when I was writing that article which is by the way now in the bin of my laptop. (I am writing a new article in between meetings). This just reminds me of just how little I know and we know about anything really. How fragile our plans are and our world is.

When I read the Makin Report (I confess I couldn't finish the reading not only because it was 250 pages long but because it was just too distressful), what stood out for me was how charming the perpetrator, John Smythe QC, was. He was a respected lawyer as his title suggests. Many people remembered him as an intelligent, eloquent, charismatic man. Who wouldn't want to befriend a man like that? But how little did they know about who he really was.

It is important to point out what's gone wrong so that we can learn from it. But it is difficult to know whether I would have been able to make the right choice had I been in the same place then. Often what we have are fragments of information. And the choice we have can be conflicting. For example, it's difficult to strike the right balance between the responsibility to minimise the risk and the principle of innocent until proven guilty. And yet, sometimes we have to make a decision based on the only information we have there.

Please don't get me wrong. I am not trying to take a side here by any means or to put forward my own view on a certain matter. We are living in a world that is being deeply polarised. The middle ground is getting narrower as people are forced to choose a side. Consequently, it becomes harder and harder for people to hold a space in between. A space for mystery, for listening, for waiting. A space where is safe to say that we simply don't know or don't understand. A space for the Holy Spirit to hover over the water of the unknown before bringing new possibilities into the world. A space that we leave unoccupied for God to be born in the midst of our life. If that space is getting narrower, we must ask to whom or what are we handing that space over?

Recently I have been on a pilgrimage to Berlin as part of a training programme that I am taking part of. The intention of this pilgrimage was to see and feel places of suffering and failure including the ones of the Church. One thing that we all confessed during the pilgrimage was this: How little did we know. How little do we know still about the sufferings of this world, the complexity of the reality of this world.

During our free time, I visited a museum called, Topography of Terror in Berlin. This museum stands on the former site of the principal instruments of Nazi persecution and terror: The headquarters of the SS and Gestapo.

One of the things that stood out for me there was that most of those who were in the inner circle of Hitler's leadership were far from heroes of Aryanism which they promoted so eagerly. In fact, most of them, including Hitler himself, were fearful people. They struggled with issues of insecurity and anxieties. Perhaps that explains, at least partly, why they were so obsessed with this idea of supremacy.

Coming back to myself in this polarising world. If I were to draw a map of my mind then there would be a very small corner of the things of what I know. Then there would be this vast fields of things of what I don't know or don't

understand fully. And I can see how easily I can be seduced by the voices of fear that tempts me to bring clarity to that fields of unknown by choosing a side or by accepting a conspiracy theory or simply by rejecting what I see as the other or foreign. It is very powerful.

Three is another powerful deception of fear. One of the worst and yet most powerful deception that fear can throw at us is to make us to see only the problems while preventing us to see what we have achieved.

Fear tells us that there is a problem and we are in trouble. Faith tells us that there is God even in the midst of trouble and He is with us. When I look at the news and see all those things that trouble us. But when I look around me and around the life of Abington Church, I see amazing signs of God's grace and faithfulness. Of course, things are not perfect. Of course, we have works to do and things to improve. Nevertheless, I think we should be really proud of where we got to. I think we should really respect and appreciate the journey that we have taken and the miles that we have done. It's not just fortune that we are where we are. It's the grace of God but also the faithful responses of the people of God that led us to where we are.

The things we have done together this year alone: We had new belivers' group, 8-weeks Sermon Series on the 800th anniversary with friends from the past, family fun afternoon, musical talents afternoon, celebration service of thanksgiving with immersion baptism, visioning exercise under the oak for 6 weeks, fete, parish BBQ, another family fun afternoon with more than a hundred of children and families, hymns of 800 years, another celebration service of rededication with confirmation, commissioning of a new Icon: Christ with the church in the park, another musical talent afternoon, three afternoon tea events with charities, another 8-weeks sermon series on Kingdom, more than 1224 butterflies decorating the church, supporting schools, care homes, supporting Baby Basics, Christians Against Poverty, Ethiopian children with Breakfast Club, Read Easy, Christian Aid... I haven't mentioned it all.

It's not the number of tasks and events that make me proud of being part of Abington. It's the generosity, dedication, patience, faith, prayerfulness, kindness, forgiveness that I saw in all of them and beyond. For that and for you, I give thanks to God.

Thank you for making Christ visible in this place. That's what we celebrated on this 800<sup>th</sup> year of the first known Rector of Abington, the constant witness of

God's faithful people to the love of Christ for his people. It is a joy and privilege to take a small part in that great chain.


## **Prayer Requests**
