Rector's Pastoral Letter

Ash Wednesday and Valentine's day

This year, Ash Wednesday and Valentine's day fell on the same day. How often do you think this happens? It happened in 2018 which was the first time in a century. And then this year. Then the next time will be in 2029. After that, it won't happen again until the year 2170!

It is a pretty rare occasion. I wonder if there is a message in this? In fact, I think there is something in common between the Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day. That is love.

Love? Wasn't Ash Wednesday about repentance? Wasn't that why we put ashes on our foreheads as a symbol of repentance and our mortality?

Yes, that's part of the story. But there is more to that story which I would like to talk to you about. It has to do with a story that is the beginning of all stories. The story of creation.

The Bible tells us that God created us and this world out of nothing. Before that there was nothing. This is the starting point of all Christian theology. *Creatio ex Nihilo*: Creation from Nothing.

So what made God to create us and the world? Well, there is no other reason than it was the choice that God made out of his absolute freedom.

He didn't have to make any of us. It wasn't like he needed a company or he was feeling lonely or bored. He didn't owe anything to anyone. And yet God, in his super abundant, overflowing love, chose to make each and every one of us. And he did so in such a unique way. Every single one of us is a handmade, limited edition, uniquely reflecting God's own image and glory. If we were on a

shopping catalogue for Valentine's day, we would have been the most expensive, unique item. 'Hand made by God'. How about that as a tag to wear? But there is another message in it which is this: Our life didn't begin from us. Your life didn't begin from you. My life didn't begin from me. It began from God and his love. Before God's hands touched us, we were nothing. Creatio ex nihilo! So we hear the words as we receive ashes. 'Remember you are dust.' But did you notice, there is a profound hope in that phrase?

Our life didn't begin from us. It began from God. And because it began from God and his love, no matter how big a mess we make with our lives, it cannot undo what God has started in the first place. We are still uniquely handmade by God with his love. If we can remember that, those ashes become a sign of hope as well as repentance.

There is one more thing to remember. God who created us out of nothing does not want us to turn back to nothing. That is why we will hear the story of Noah on the first Sunday of Lent. Even in the deepest pit of sin and corruption, God leads Noah to renew his covenant with his creation.

In the same way, God will complete his creation in us that began in the beginning. If we can receive that promise through faith, then those ashes become a sign of God's promise as well as our mortality. Though our mortal bodies and organisms of this world may turn back to ashes, the work of God in us and the purpose of his love that breathed life into us will be fulfilled. He will bring all his creation into completion. Everyone and everything will be made anew. Nothing will be in vain. No one will be lost. And he wants you and me to be part of that work towards completion. This ultimate hope and promise of faith is the other story of Ash Wednesday.

So St. Paul said,

As we work together with God, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says,

'At an acceptable time I have listened to you," and on a day of salvation I have helped you.'

See, now is the acceptable time; see, now is the day of salvation! As servants of God we have commended ourselves in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatings, imprisonments, riots, labours, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patience, kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; with the weapons

of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honour and dishonour, in ill repute and good repute.

We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as unknown, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and yet not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as having nothing, and yet possessing everything. (2 Cor 6.1-10)

Ash Wednesday calls us to remember not only the need for repentance but also the hope and promise in God's creation. Without them, repentance and the ashes on our foreheads is little more than the sad reminder of our mortality and limitations. But if we can remember that the foundation of Ash Wednesday and Lent is love and grace of God, then we can wear our ashes lightly. For these ashes will be to us a sign of hope, love and God's faithfulness that was shown in the beginning of the creation.

And perhaps then, our Ash Wednesday and this Lenten journey may be marked not only by the dark ashes on our foreheads but also by the smiles on our face and the joy in our hearts.

Stewardship Campaign 2024

We are encouraging everyone to prayerfully discern their giving to the church as we run Stewardship Campaign. Here are some encouraging facts about stewardship. These are just part of the larger picture and the important differences you are making by your giving.

Since the last Stewardship Campaign (Sep 2019) and thanks to your generosity we have:

- Reached to adults over **12,191** times, to children over **1,337** times, and to those online over **11,191** times with the gospel through worship.
- Comforted **2,795** bereaved people through funerals at church, blessed **1,153** people who came to celebrate weddings and baptised **30** souls.
- Shared the gospel with children, young people and their families through Littles Fishes over **1,050** times, through Junior Church over **950** times, through bouncy castles, special events and services over **970** times, and through churchyard projects such as ribbons, hearts and trails more than **15,000** times. Also during the Lockdowns, we reached out to families in need over **70** times through cards and activity packs.
- Shared the love of Christ with the elderly through services in local care homes for **627** times, through home communion and pastoral visits for **308** times, through Bible Studies for **199** times, and through Communion at St. Christopher's for **5,369** times.

Introducing All-Age Eucharist

We are pleased to introduce you to All-Age Eucharist which will occur every two months. All-Age Eucharist is not just for children. However there is something that the Bible encourages us to learn from children. After all, we all are called to be children of God. So it is important that we, as a church, strive to build an identity of one big family that worships together. So our All-Age Eucharist aspire to make our worship simpler, humbler and more inclusive and accessible to all regardless of their age and where their might be in their journey of faith.

The first All-Age Eucharist will be on 10th of March, Mothering Sunday. And then following dates: 12th of May, 14th of July, 8th of September, 3rd of November.

Thank you message from Baby Basics

Last year, we filled several Moses baskets in church, filled with your love and helpful items for babies and mums as we continued to work together with Baby Basics, Northampton, a charity that supports babies and mums in need. This is one of the messages that we received from them.

A few weeks ago, a Health Visitor called who was extremely worried about a family in Northampton she had just met who didn't have a safe place for their baby to sleep and barely any of the essentials baby needed.



We were able to provide them with an emergency neutral starter pack that was held by St Peter and St Paul Abington Chur ch in case of an urgent need in their community.

This meant they had a Moses basket, bedding, clothing, toiletries for baby, toiletries for the new mum and our referrer has peace of mind.

We are incredibly thankful for the support of the church and a particular thank you to Melissa who made herself available to meet the Health Visitor to hand over the pack

The church will hold this family in their prayers at their service today. St Peter and St Paul Abington Church have provided so much generosity to us already over the last 12 months and this emergency referral showed the importance of our community working together to support vulnerable families in Northamptonshire

Lent Lunches

We hosted our first Lent Lunch on Saturday 17th February, and it was well attended. We are hosting two more on March 9th and 23rd. All donations at our lunches will be going to our Lent Charities; the Chole Breakfast Club (more info below) and Christian Aid. Please come along and support if you are able.

The Chole Breakfast Club, Debre Birhan, Ethiopia

A couple of weeks ago Bishop Andrew spoke to us about The Chole Breakfast Club. Here is summary of what he said.

Chole Primary School is in Debre Birhan, one of the poorest regions of Ethiopia, Children were often skipping school; and those who came to school hungry often collapsed in class because they had had to walk for two hours, on an empty stomach, to get there. The situation became so bad that teachers started giving up their monthly salaries to give the children breakfast.



The Breakfast Club brought positive change in the well-being of children, especially their health with many suffering from anaemia making massive improvement. Children's education performance also showed significant improvement. The School now provide children with a nutritious breakfast, they also provide the uniforms, books and writing materials. The School also works with parents or guardians, providing training in basic business skills. Parents are also given advice on how to feed their children cheaply and healthily, to reduce malnutrition.

Our money will help 60 children:

- Providing food over 20 days a month for 10 months a year for each child £16,500 (that's £1.30 for each meal)
- Providing uniforms and school materials £2,100 (that's £35 for each child)
- Providing parents/guardians' with business training and some seed funding £7,483 (that's £124 for each guardian/child)


