I wonder what stands out most to you when you look back on 2024. For me, there are many moments, but if I had to choose just one, one scene comes to mind.

It was the day before our celebration service, when we were going to hold full immersion baptisms outdoors. We had already built the baptismal pool, which we borrowed from Grange Park. Everything for the service was ready. The only thing left was the water. We needed to fill 1,100 litres. Literally, a ton of water.



It was early in the morning, probably around 8 a.m. A massive water tanker lorry from Anglian Water pulled up, thanks to Melissa and Mace. Two men connected a thick, high-pressure hose to the tanker, and they released the water. It was so powerful. It took just ten minutes to fill the pool, which would usually take at least two hours.

I loved that sign on the tanker: "Keeping Water Flowing."

I think that phrase symbolically describes what we have been trying to do.

You see, we did everything we could last year to mark the 800th anniversary. We wanted to make visible what God has been doing for us, with us, and through us in this community. Events, services, courses, welcoming people, inviting them to confirmation and baptism.

All of these were important, but they are like the high-pressure hose. They are channels so that God's life-giving water, His life-changing Spirit can flow into the life of this community.

And that is what we witnessed together. How God poured out His grace and blessing on this place and on the life of this community. Everything we do here is about keeping God's lifegiving water flowing, just like that logo said.

You may not remember this, but at the beginning of 2024, we set out three visions for the Church in the Park:

- **Inspiring Church:** Just like the park inspires people and helps them to encounter God, we aspire to be a church that inspires through worship and prayer.
- **Compassionate Church:** Just like the park is a place of comfort and restoration in God's grace, we pray to be a church that comforts the anxious, isolated, marginalised, and bereaved through our service and outreach.
- **Generous Church:** Just like the park welcomes everyone and helps them to flourish in God's abundance and generosity, we want to be a church that is welcoming and generous, especially to strangers and those who feel far from God.

It does not matter whether we remember the exact words. What matters is living them out. And I truly believe we have strived to do that. That is reflected, at least in part, by the numbers.

Here are some of the things we have seen under this vision:

- Over 20,000 ribbons of prayer
- Over 1,400 butterflies of celebration
- Over £5,800 raised for those in need and for charities
- 21 people baptised (12 of them believers' baptisms, professing faith in Jesus. 7 were baptised by immersion outdoors, which was a powerful witness to the community)
- 15 people confirmed

All of this happened in one year. We saw more confirmations and believers' baptisms in one year than in the previous ten years combined.

We also inspired other churches. Cath Maddison, one of the leaders at Long Buckby Church, said in a message that they were inspired by our ribbons of prayer. They launched their own version and received 60 prayers.

They ended their project by moving the ribbons onto a cross inside the church. It was very well received by the village, with many positive comments. Cath and Long Bugby expressed their thanks to us for letting them borrow the idea.

The church in Wootton was also inspired by our full immersion baptisms. They are preparing to hold their first one soon.

This my friends, tells me that we are growing together to be more like Christ: Inspiring, compassionate, and generous.

Again, whether or not you remember, we identified four specific areas for growth through our Under the Oak sessions:

- **Feeding**: Physically and spiritually through the lunch club, fundraising for charities, home groups, and youth church.
- **Community**: Through Little Fishes, family events, schools, care homes, outreach projects, and the Tree of Hope.
- **Person**: One person at a time. Honouring their gifts and responding to their needs. We nurture our curate, our lay ministers, and we commissioned a new Anna Chaplain. We support vocations and those who are new to faith.
- **Space**: How can we create spaces that are sacred, restorative, and filled with the Spirit? We offer reflective services, home groups, and prayer ministry. We keep the church open. I believe this is an area that needs more encouragement and support. It is so important, and I look forward to sharing more with you about it.

There are many other tasks and issues for us to pray about and discern together. One is our response to the Living in Love and Faith process which I am going to discern together with the PCC in the coming months before I bring it to the whole congregation. I am committed to approaching this with care and pastoral sensitivity. My hope is that through our shared discernment, we will reach a deeper experience of love, faith, and grace in our community.

Whatever we do and whatever challenges we may face, let us remember one thing. We are here to keep the life-giving water of Christ flowing.

The good news is that we are not the source. The water flows from Christ. We are the hose-pipe.

Our task is simple. To remain connected to the source. Like that image on the lorry said: **Keeping the life-giving water of Christ flowing** in our lives, in our discipleship, in our prayer, in our community.

Amen.



'Little Fishes' - Abington Church Baby and Toddler Group

'Little Fishes' meets at the Church Rooms every Monday morning from 10 am to 11.15 am during term time. The group was opened in February 2022, as the Covid restrictions were lifted. The purpose of the group was to support families with young children, by offering a



welcoming space and providing fellowship and care. As a church group we share our faith through the love and support that we provide to all.

In recent months there has been a desire to explore, with those who attend, what direction the group should take. Therefore I devised a short questionnaire for all those who attend the group. 20 questionnaires were issued to parents, grandparents and carers who bring their children to 'Little Fishes'. 10 completed forms were returned.

Here are some of the replies regarding why they like attending the group -

- 'Cathy and all the helpers are so friendly, the toys and activities cover all ages and there is a nice atmosphere.'
- 'An opportunity for safe socialising and play. Nice to meet with other grandparents and carers'
- 'I find it difficult to attend church regularly so it's great to be able to play whilst taking part in prayer.'

Questions about faith were included in the questionnaire.

What do you think about the worship time we have at the end of each session?

All 10 replies were very positive about this part of our time together. Comments such as 'I really enjoy it, and the children like the tea lights and enjoy joining in.' and 'I like it as it is not too religious but it is inclusive.' and 'It's the perfect time – long enough to introduce bible stories but short enough to keep children engaged.'

Asked whether they were open to the Christian faith, 6 out of 10 replies said 'yes'. 4 out of 10 replied to say that they would like more help regarding teaching their children to pray. 6 out of 10 said they would like to keep in touch with the church when their children went to primary school.

As a result of these encouraging responses we plan to build on the ideas and comments that those attending the group have provided.

Sharing our faith and helping parents and others to develop their children's spirituality is so important. 'Little Fishes' is a wonderful opportunity to do just this.
